This Saturday: Join us for a Guided Fishing Paddle

Have you ever wondered - how is fishing on the Yellow River?

Living on the river, near Emerson Bridge, we stop to talk to most anyone that is enjoying the river in some manner. The locals and old timers all seem to have great fishing stories and fond memories of the river and the fish within. The YRPC began to wonder ourselves and it's time for all to find out!

On Saturday, Aug 24th you are invited to paddle and experience fishing on The Yellow River for yourself. The event is free, and we will have a \$100 "door prize."

The paddle will be guided by Silent River Smallmouth, a guiding service provided by Roger Leef. Roger is somewhere between a local treasure and a local legend. He has been fishing the Yellow River since he was a boy, and has been a guide for many years. The finer points of fishing for smallmouth on the Yellow, and many stories about the river itself, will be shared.





And it is true!! Roger took myself and my neighbor, Mark Fenton, down the Yellow as a test along the route we will be using on the Aug 24th group paddle. We learned a lot, had a great time, and caught some nice Smallmouth Bass.

Details for Saturday: Meet us at Norman's Landing at 9 a.m. Norman's Landing is located on Norman's Landing Road, which heads south off of Gaslyn Creek Road (north and west of Hertel in Burnett County). We'll take vehicles to Whistler's Bridge at the start; shuttle vehicles will be available to take everyone back to Norman's Landing to launch. We'll paddle for approximately 2 and a half hours, depending on how good the fishing is.

\$1,000 Donation Will Pay For Phosphorus Monitoring at One Sampling Site

A gift of \$1,000 will pay the cost of phosphorus monitoring equipment and laboratory work at one site for one year. Channel-choking aquatic weed growth is a problem on the lower river. It could be caused by excessive phophorus in the river. Question is, "Where does the phosphorus come from?" Phosphorus testing at various sites can help locate the source. Help control excessive aquatic weed growth by donating \$1,000.00 (or whatever amount you wish). Designate your gift to be used for a phosphorus testing site.

For Sale: YRPC's 4.6 Acre River Lot

This is the first opportunity to purchase a beautiful riverside building site being offered for a short time to YRPC members. The property will be listed for sale to the general public in September.

The property at W7309 HWY 70 offers privacy and seclusion within a short distance of downtown Spooner. Located across the river from DNR property, development of the opposite shore is unlikely. The parcel is made up of two pieces, a one acre parcel in the Town of Evergreen and 3.69 acres in the City of Spooner. Yellow River frontage totals 360 feet. YRPC will apply deed restrictions to protect the shoreline, prevent sub-division and preclude commercial development. A beautiful, spacious building site is set aside for a family dwelling with a beautiful view of the river.

W3709 Highway 70 was purchased under YRPC's BUY-PROTECT-SELL-REPEAT program. Proceeds from the sale will be used to purchase and protect another watershed property.

A \$348.00 donation (one month's payment on the W 3709 Highway 70 mortgage) will put YRPC one step closer to its next BUY-PROTECT-SELL-REPEAT purchase. Shoreland of our first purchase (see accompanying article)will be legally protected through deed requirements and the entire parcel will be listed for public sale later in September. However, until W3709 is sold, YRPC must make monthly mortgage payments of \$348.

Become a YRPC "Guardian of the River" with the "Score My Shore" Survey

Put your star on the map for river protection!

Shoreland owners are fortunate to have a tool to evaluate how our buildings and activities on the shore could be affecting the lake or river where we live. The Wisconsin Healthy Lakes and Rivers program developed the "Score My Shore" survey, patterned after a similar program in Michigan. The survey walks you through questions about the physical aspects of your lake or river property, as well as how you manage it. The tool is entirely voluntary and is not used for regulatory purposes. You can decide whether to register for an account or answer the survey questions anonymously.

The survey tool takes into account the answers provided, and returns a rating of "entry," "restoration," "enhancement," or "protection" (the most lake or river-friendly level). The immediate, on-line feedback helps landowners understand the overall rating and recommends specific projects that can help protect the lake or river.

Quiz Question Answer

Don't these look like fungi or mushrooms that would eventually rot away into a gooey mass?

These are commonly called Ghost Pipes, and they are actually an herbaceous, perennial, flowering plant (Monotropa uniflora) native to temperate regions of Asia, North America, and northern South America. After "blooming" they actually dry up into a stiff, hard stalk (shown below).



YRPC Provides Stipends to Private Landowners for Conservation Measures

At its March meeting, the YRPC Board approved a way to reward private landowners who protect the Yellow River Watershed through land conservation measures.

In the upcoming year, YRPC will provide stipends for officially-recorded deed restrictions and conservation easements as part of our "Guardians of the River" program. To qualify, these measures must assure one or more of the following: restoration or protection of natural vegetative buffers along river, lake, or stream frontage; restoration or protection of shoreline, wetland, and aquatic habitat; runoff correction or prevention; assurance of a natural scenic view from the river, etc.

This year, we are offering \$250 stipends to qualified applicants for placement of deed restrictions, and \$500 for conservation easements completed through a qualified land trust. For more information, contact us at protect.yr@gmail.com.
